Message from the Chair

2025 brings more changes, updates and additions to our department.

In March 2024, UCLA purchased West Hills Medical Center. As we begin work on integrating UCLA West Valley into the DEM in 2025, we'll see many new faces, and hopefully a few familiar ones as well. We anticipate installing EPIC at West Valley in March 2025, and we successfully incorporated WV into our Core DGSOM medical student EM rotation in October 2024. Our Toxicologists have obtained privileges for inpatient consultations throughout the hospital.

Spotlight on Toxicology:

Our division of Toxicology has made some major strides in the past few years. Not too long ago, there were no toxicologists at Reagan or Santa Monica. Now we have 3 full-time toxicologists who are providing inpatient and outpatient consultations in Tox and Addiction Medicine at RR and SM, and as noted above, we are in the process of adding coverage at West Valley. We launched our ACGME-approved fellowship this past year and matched our second fellow for July 2025. Our Tox division has been very active clinically, teaching, and in research. All three are involved in research projects, and Hannah just received an early investigator grant from the American College of Medical Toxicology.

Remembering Dan Hoh (2009)

Daniel "Dan" Hoh (1979-2024), died after a long battle with multiple myeloma. Dan was born and raised in Maryland. He worked as an EMT in Baltimore and had a brief internship with the FBI before attending medical school at Vanderbilt University. He always had an interest in telling stories, a creative side that he explored as a medical reporter and broadcast journalist for WBKO-13 (ABC affiliate) in Bowling Green, KY, and as a staff writer with the ABC News Medical Unit (Boston) and ABCNews.com.





















Dan was committed to global health starting in 1997 and continuing throughout his career. He worked on international projects in Sierra Leone, Peru, Cambodia, Thailand, Dominican Republic, and Mexico, as a global health physician providing medical care, public health education, community development, and anti-human trafficking efforts with many partner organizations.

As a resident Dan is remembered for his intellect and ability as well as for how he made people feel. Many will remember his easy smile, positive attitude, and great hair. One alumna on hearing of his passing said "I will always remember his positive spirit, almost as high as his hair." During residency he mentioned his aspirations to write in the entertainment industry. After graduating residency he joined the faculty at Cedars Sinai and remained there throughout his career. After settling into his emergency medicine career he did in fact pursue his writing as well.



In 2010, he combined his medical and global health work with his story telling as director, writer, and editor of "SIERRA LEONE: DARKNESS TO LIGHT", a documentary film about community development and public health challenges in Sierra Leone. This film was produced as part of a humanitarian medical project and served as a fundraising tool for building an elementary school in the city of Bo. While working as an EM physician at Cedars Sinai he developed and honed his writing skills taking classes through UCLA extension and he joined the CBS Diversity Writing program. In 2016 wrote for the show *Pure Genius*. In 2020 he joined the ABC show *Station 19* where in addition to writing, he ascended to the title of producer in its final season.



Dan was 45 when he died, and leaves behind his parents, a brother, his wife Debbie and a son, Dylan. Dan remained close with many of his classmates.

Danielle Schindler ... I remember Dan's infectious energy, and the deep compassion that fueled his interest in medicine. He could be self-effacing and humble, yet confident in the manner essential in our speciality. At the hardest times, he could bear the weight of tragedy with patients and colleagues with true empathy, but there was a jovial spirit that stayed present within him like a pilot light. He will be greatly missed.



Jack Casey... Dan and I met 20 years ago in Boston during our internship interviews. Fortunately for me, we ended up not only doing our internship together, but also residency at UCLA and our first attending physician jobs at Cedars.



Over the past two decades, we shared many great moments and experiences - many related to food - including trips to Chicago and San Francisco where we enjoyed Dan's first dinner at a Michelin starred restaurant. Those of you who are aware of Dan's fast metabolism may not be surprised to hear that after a delicious fairly rich 9 course meal....in which I left feeling stuffed—Dan stopped to get some fast food on our way home. That was the only time I've been to a Michelin starred restaurant and a Taco Bell in one evening.



We stayed close friends since - often getting together to eat and catch up.

Dan of course had many great qualities. Some that struck me the most were Dan's altruism, faith, gratitude and positive attitude even in the face of adversity.

I still recall a conversation after a tough call night as an intern. It was a stressful and sleepless night for Dan. What I remember most about the conversation is that he talked not about his lack of sleep but rather his concern for the sick patients that kept him up all night.



Years later when he told me about his diagnosis of multiple myeloma, his need for multiple BM transplants or other health related setbacks — he never complained — but rather expressed gratitude for his family, his friends and the medical care he was receiving, and asked about me and my family.

Like all of us I'll miss Dan. I have become a better person because of the time I shared with Dan, and find some small amount of solace in knowing that Dan would feel satisfaction in knowing that his positive influence will effect all of us and the future decisions we make.

Jo Feldman Retired and is Living her Best Life

Never one to be the center of attention, Jo Feldman, with a bit of begging, finally indulged the newsletter editor with an interview - We are so grateful for all of your contributions and friendship. Jo was what some may call non-traditional, although her path is deliberate and connected across her education and activities. She graduated college with a BS in Environmental Education, and then a few years later went back to school and received a Masters of Science in Environmental Education from the Audobon Expedition Institute. She was an EMT/ paramedic who worked as a tech in the ED at Santa Monica UCLA and was also a National Park Ranger. She later went back to get her MD at UCSF, EM training at the Stanford-Kaiser program, Wilderness Fellowship, and is board certified in Undersea and Hyperbaric Medicine. She worked in several different

emergency departments, critical access hospitals, more than a decade as an Expedition Ship Physician, as a flight physician for the Ventura County Sheriff's Department Search & Rescue Helicopter Unit, served as Antarctic Base Physician at Palmer Station and Space Operations Physician at SpaceX, launched our Space Medicine Fellowship as the Inaugural Director, was our Wilderness Medicine Fellowship Director, and provided service as Camp Physician for the Painted Turtle for a decade, and several years as Medical Director for the California AIDS Life Cycle.....She has left the building, left the state, hung up her stethoscope, and moved to Kansas and live with the love of her life. She continues to enjoy her CrossFit, tennis, and travel. She was recently scuba diving in Indonesia with a whale shark.



A Jake Lentz (2019) Interview with Jo Feldman

How are you enjoying the move so far? **Definitely**. Life is so much easier here. No traffic. Gas is under \$3/gallon. Everything is cheaper. Watching storm clouds is incredible.

How's the surf? Haven't checked out the local surf spots yet. Been too busy playing tennis at the local country club.

As a born-and-raised Californian used to water and mountains, how is the adjustment to the plains and lakes? It is definitely different here. Incredibly flat but with that you get great views of the sky. And there is very dynamic weather here. One day it can be 80 degrees, then the next day it's raining hard, 40 degrees and there is a tornado watch. Most lakes seem to be man made but it's always great to go out on the pontoon boat, cruise at 5 knots, and enjoy the sunset.

Do you miss working 15 overnights in a row? **Not at all. Don't even miss working 1 night a month.**

As a fellow nocturnist, I have to ask – why? For me it is a combination of the obvious fact that they can't let anyone important see me there during the day and also I really don't like morning shifts, but you're much more presentable and I don't think you need much sleep – so why? I loved working overnights because there were typically less patients, fewer administrative staff, and, equally important, no

traffic driving to and from Malibu to Westwood.

Plus there is a pay differential and typically it is easier to get hired if you say you are willing to work nights.

Like me, you went to med school after you had another career.
Unlike me, you did something meaningful before medicine. How did you end up a forest ranger? As a child I always wanted to be a



national park ranger or an astronaut. Wanting to be a ranger was because every summer my parents took me to visit the national parks and I loved it - the hiking, going to campfire talks and ranger-led walks, the beauty, etc. So I ended up studying environmental education, and once I finished graduate school (which involved traveling around North America in a school bus, camping out every night, learning about the environment, and making most decisions by consensus - yikes!), I got a job as a park ranger at Sequoia National Park.

Among other "outside" things that I find concerning, you're famous for your trips to Antarctica. How does one end up a South Pole doctor? What kind of crazy cases have you had there? And also I feel like if you got to the South Pole once, that should be more than enough, right? Firstly, I have never been to the

South Pole (but I have been to the North Pole!). I did however work at one of the other US Antarctic Program stations - Palmer Station - for 2 6-month summer deployments. That came about because I had been going to Antarctica as a ship doctor for ecotourism companies (if you are taking paying passengers to Antarctica you need a doctor to care for them because you are so remote). After doing that for a few years I wanted to spend more time down south so I applied with the US Antarctic Program. In addition to being the station doctor at Palmer Station and a ship doctor, I've also sailed to Antarctica from the Falkland Islands twice on small sailboats with a friend who is a penguinologist and helped him conduct research such as collecting penguin poop, holding penguins so he could attach radio trackers and drawing blood samples from penguin feet. In total, I have been to Antarctica 16 seasons which adds up to well over 2 years of my life and over 30 expeditions. And I'll be heading south again at the end of December.

Since you were the fellowship director for the Space Fellowship – would you go to space if given the chance? For me it's a hard nyet, but I feel like you'd go and bring a surfboard, just in case. Well as I said I've wanted to be an astronaut since I was a kid-probably because I spent way too much of my childhood years watching tv shows like Star Trek and reading science fiction books. So, yes, I would love to go to space if given the chance but I'm betting on Haig going before me. But IF i do go I doubt I would bring a surfboard rather I would bring my mountain bike and explore the landscape.

Are you planning any visits back to California? Maybe a guest lecture about dive medicine (one of the highlights of residency for me)? Oh, I will definitely be back to California - so many good people/ friends there - but not sure I will be giving any talks. As days pass I can't imagine practicing

emergency medicine other than being an expedition/ship doctor.

One thing I really liked about working with you as a resident was your practical approach to medicine. You were also always smart about figuring out how to meet patients where they were at and how they'd get follow up and so on. How'd you learn that, since it's not ubiquitous in our specialty? **No freaking clue.**

I know we are all going to miss you. For the interns who are just starting and the residents who won't get the full Jo Feldman Experience – what words of wisdom do you want to offer us? Trust your gut/follow your heart, even if that means you stop working as an emergency physician, leave Malibu and move to the midwest.


Our November get together was hosted at a pottery studio. Thanks to Sami Maisel (2028), who besides being an amazing intern is actually an

IDHEAL and Social EM Updates





Leadership


The new year brings changes to our EDI leadership and thus an opportunity to look at all that has been accomplished in the past year. Special recognition goes to Drs. Greg Hendey (1993), Medell Briggs-Malonson (Chief of Health Equity, Diversity and Inclusion for the UCLA Hospital and Clinic System), and our Department Leader Jamie Bell. Our work could not have been done without all of the contributions of many faculty and residents. In particular Rose Diaz and Jess Faiz have helmed many of our efforts and were instrumental in helping Jamie Bell put together our Department report. It is thus fitting and reassuring that our efforts will continue with the two of them as our new Co-Directors of EDI. And while Jamie Bell transitions to Assistant Program Director, his commitment and contributions to our EDI efforts are unwavering.



Faculty Recruitment and Retention

In 2022 we initiated new strategies to recruit faculty and residents that reflect diverse identities, experiences, and scholarly expertise. We incorporated VC JEDI and EDI focused faculty into search committees, implemented an objective process to assess all candidates to decrease bias, and expanded our recruitment "net" across the country. We have recruited more than 17 new full time faculty, and 24% URiM and 53% women.


We have incorporated several key strategies to support growth and retention, including the JEDI Professional Development Lecture series, which features engaging lectures and workshops led by faculty, residents, and esteemed guest speakers. The series included invited grand rounds speakers Dr. Diana Ramos, CA Surgeon General, who presented "Adverse Childhood Experiences" and Dr. Hemal Kanzaria who presented "A Broader View of Health: The Case for Social Medicine." These conferences were opened up to attendees from all across UCLA Health. The lecture series also included our faculty and resident lectures on Abortion Care in the ED, Trauma Informed Emergency Care, Perspectives on Homelessness, Opioid Use Disorder Insights and Treatment, Why EDI is Important, and Harm Reduction Practices. The next iteration of this series will be to finalize a standard core curriculum focused on racism and other forms of discrimination in EM and healthcare that scaffolds the content to promote deeper learning. Through strategic consultation with Dr. Edgardo Ordonez, past president of SAEM ADIEM, we will also launch an invited EDI guest speaker series in the second quarter of 2025, which will include leading emergency medicine experts to conduct workshops and speaking engagements on EDI topics.





URIM Mentorship and Sponsorship Program

One of our most exciting initiatives is the URiM Mentorship and Sponsorship Program that will launch in April 2025. This program pairs participants with senior faculty mentors who provide career guidance and support with an emphasis on culturally congruent mentorship, ensuring that mentors are equipped to support their mentees effectively. This program complements and adds to our ongoing resident, faculty and student engagement and recruitment efforts and EDI social events.



We have several patient care initiatives to: (1) Improve access to care for patients with Medi-Cal. Faculty lead Dr. Jess Faiz helped spearhead this work and published some of the findings exploring the barriers to care. We are working to identify problems and delays, develop data-driven solutions

and set up a model that can be adopted by other departments. (2) Enhance care for patients living with sickle cell disease with Faculty Lead Dr. Natasha Thomas. We are participating in a system-wide workgroup to improve treatment and care transitions for these patients (personalized care plans, education and implicit bias training with staff). (3) ED-Based Community Health Workers (CHWs) program with faculty lead Dr. Liz Samuels to help address social needs and drivers of health, and to build collaboration across the health system with the CHWs working within family medicine, trauma surgery, and our Homeless Healthcare Collaborative. (4) In 2024, faculty leads Drs. Annette Dekker, Jamie Bell, and Richelle Cooper as well as Enrico Castillo from the Department of Psychiatry began work to address a patient care structural equity goal to establish comprehensive, standardized policies for managing law enforcement presence and patient custody interactions in clinical settings.



Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Section In Review

Climate

Fostering an inclusive and respectful environment for our faculty, learners, staff, and patients is at the heart of our mission and fuels our drive for excellence. In 2024, we set an ambitious goal to elevate our departmental climate through impactful initiatives. These included implementing comprehensive bias training across the department, launching an annual Climate Assessment Survey to gain critical insights, and establishing regular feedback sessions to address concerns and promote continuous improvement. These proposed initiatives were anchored in our commitment to create a culture where every individual feels valued and empowered to thrive.

Bias Training

To ensure that our incoming resident physicians are equipped with the right tools to provide high-quality, equitable care to the diverse populations of Los Angeles, the department integrated bias and inclusion topics into the Intern Boot Camp. Dr. Medell Briggs-Malonson now provides an annual inspiring and data driven lecture to the incoming 1st year residents on the demographic landscape of Los Angeles, healthcare finance, and bias mitigation. Drs. Diaz and Faiz also present on health equity in academic medicine. These efforts underscore our commitment to equipping residents with the tools to provide equitable, high-quality care to the diverse populations we serve. The DEM will partner with the Office of Health Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (HEDI) to provide Bias and Inclusive Leadership training that is relevant to emergency medicine department wide to all residents, staff, and faculty.

Community Outreach

In 2024, UCLA DEM deepened its community partnerships and broadened its outreach efforts. Focused on driving meaningful change, the department set 3 primary goals: to implement a collaborative high school outreach program in an under-resourced community, expand engagement with the Homeless Healthcare Collaborative (HHC), and launch authentic community awareness and education campaigns. Dr. Jesus Torres organized a multidisciplinary health professions panel held at San Fernando High School. This event represented a departure from our previous approach of standalone career days. Instead, we created an integrated experience that brought together diverse healthcare voices from our emergency department ecosystem—faculty, residents, nurses, pharmacists, and technicians. The panel's success stemmed from our intentional



preparation with school administrators and teachers to understand their students' specific needs and barriers to pursuing healthcare careers. Students engaged with our ED team members, who shared not just their career paths, but also personal challenges and triumphs, particularly resonating with those from similar backgrounds. The DEM also started a strong new partnership with Jack and Jill of America, Inc. In March 2024, DEM residents and faculty conducted a health and emergency preparedness session with 15 middle school aged students. The session consisted of interactive didactics around cardiovascular health and sickle cell disease followed by hands-on activities including CPR, suturing, and hemorrhage control. The session ended with a dynamic conversation between the resident physicians and students about their accomplishments and challenges on the journey to becoming a physician and the importance of having more Black physicians in medicine. The next session will take place in January 2025.

Community Awareness and Education Campaigns

We have initiated several great steps towards community education. Dr. Jesus Torres has been serving as a health contributor for Telemundo, delivering multiple Spanish-language health education interviews over the past six months. Dr. Rose Diaz, alongside numerous EM residents and medical students, conducted bystander CPR training at more than 12 health fairs and events across Latino communities, including Pacoima, Coachella Valley, and Tijuana, Mexico. These efforts highlight our dedication to fostering authentic, two-way relationships that address community needs while promoting health and education. In addition, Rose Diaz has used these opportunities to mentor

UCLA Introduces First EM CDC Emerging Infections Fellowship - July 2026

CDC Ferguson Fellowship Partners with EMERGEncy ID NET By David Talan (1986)

Since 1995, Greg Moran (1992), Bill Mower (1990), and I have directed a CDC-funded US 12-ED-based emerging infections network called EMERGEncy ID NET, which is credited with recognizing MRSA's emergence, determining patient care-related COVID risk to ED providers, and conducting practice-changing research on management of various infections, ranging from skin abscesses to appendicitis, with publications in the highest impact journals, like NEJM and JAMA.



Along the way, we've seen growing EM resident interest in public health and global health. But there's no ready post-residency path for these career goals. One path is the CDC's Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS), a famous disease detection fellowship. EIS, however, is not focused on the ED - the sentinel for public health threats to communities, and particularly the vulnerable.



We're excited to announce the creation of the first EM Emerging Infections Fellowship, which will be based at UCLA and recruit for July '26. The training is supported through the CDC's Dr. James A. Ferguson Emerging Infections Fellowship Program – Dr. Ferguson, who founded the program in 1989, believed in building a diverse public health workforce to improve health equity for populations at risk for health disparities - https://www.cdc.gov/minority-health/student-programs/ferguson-fellowship.html



The 1-year (for those with an MPH already) or 2-year fellowship will include School of Public Health Master's program training, EMERGEncy ID NET project creation, direction, and CDC collaboration, grant writing, participation in ongoing NIH- and PCORI-funded clinical trials (see box), advanced ID-ED curriculum, and clinical micro lab and global medicine experiences. The position will have direct salary funding in addition to an opportunity for part-time faculty clinical shifts caring for underserved at Olive View-UCLA.

This fellowship training will establish a foundation for unique career paths in academic Emergency Medicine and working with leading public health agencies, such as CDC and WHO. The fellowship will be directed by Jesus Torres (JRTorres@mednet.ucla.edu) and myself (dtalan@ucla.edu). Please let us know early if you are interested.

Shamsher Samra (2017) was a featured speaker discussing transitions of care for individuals leaving carceral settings. In 2020, California was the first state to be approved by the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for a partial waiver of the "inmate exclusion policy" which has historically limited Medicaid payment for service provided during incarceration. The project, which launched in October 2024, creates new channels of Medicaid funding to carceral settings and community providers with the aim of mitigating high rates of "reentry" morbidity and mortality by improving transitions of care. Since California's approval, 24 additional states have either been approved or are pending approval of similar policies. Undoubtedly, the new policy will markedly restructure the relationship between health and carceral systems nationally.
















Way to Go UCLA EM & Alumni


